

# Support the Healthy Workplace Act: It's About Time!



## Did you know ...

- **43% of all workers** in Illinois – over 2.5 million – have no right to a single paid sick day
- Workers **can be fired** for missing work to care for their sick child or elderly parent.
- Workers who come to work sick are less productive and infect other workers, customers, and the public. **The Healthy Workplace Act will lead to substantial savings to employers** by reducing turnover and spread of the flu at work.

**Workers should not have to choose between taking a sick day and keeping a job.**

## Healthy Workplace Act (SB 128) Basics Sponsored by Sen. Martin Sandoval

**Employees, full- and part-time, can earn up to 7 paid sick days per year, accrued hourly for every 30 hours worked.**

- For example, a full-time worker earns one 8-hour sick day after 6 weeks, and 7 sick days after 42 weeks

**Provides sick day leave:** 1) for an employee's own illness; 2) to care for an ill family member; 3) for medical appointments.

**In a recent statewide poll, 78 percent of Illinois voters support this proposal.**

## **Employers will save 146% or \$272 million in benefits from this proposed bill :**

- Workers regain their health and return to full productivity faster
- Ill workers do not infect others, which decreases absentee expenses
- Reduced turnover and re-training costs
- "Presenteeism" – workers coming to work when sick – costs companies more than they spend on healthcare expenses<sup>1</sup>

## **Benefits to workers:**

- Workers most in need can stay home when illness strikes and not forfeit a day's wages. This will help:
  - 75% of low-wage workers, who do not receive paid sick days
  - 78% of working mothers with school-age children
  - the majority of workers, whose paid sick days do not allow them to care for a family member, ill spouse or aging parent with medical needs

Paid sick days are only required in San Francisco, Milwaukee and Washington, D.C.
